Are you living the Wisconsin Idea? Do you want to engage with communities in meaningful ways during your graduate career, while earning credits toward your degree and a certificate or minor?

The graduate certificate/doctoral minor in Community-Engaged Scholarship (CES) is a 9-12 credit program to train graduate students in CES, defined as teaching or research done in collaboration with community organizations or community partners in equitable, mutually beneficial, respectful relationships.

CES can include:

- Community-based (service) learning, in which students work with community organizations
 or members (typically through direct service, advocacy or policy efforts, or other projectbased work) to enhance their academic learning, professional development, and personal
 development while providing tangible benefits to the community organization and its
 constituents.
- Community-based research, a spectrum of research including community-based participatory
 research and participatory action research. In this type of research, researchers work with
 community members to address research questions or issues identified by the community itself.
 These collaborations typically yield both academic research and useful outcomes or products for
 community members, who often act as co-researchers. Additionally, the relationships between
 community partners and researchers are mutually beneficial, equitable, and respectful.
- Other community engagement and academic outreach efforts, including scholarship on CES.

Through this program, students will feel confident to teach community-based learning courses, conduct community-based research, and/or lead community engagement initiatives. There are a variety of course offerings designed to meet your needs, as well!
